

Letter to Richard Clutterbuck Esq
at Warkworth

Morpeth 7ber 14th 1748
(7ber)

Sir,

Yesterday there was a gentleman whose name is Mr Wallington from Wooton under Edge in Gloucestershire which made a particular enquiry after your --- if you were married and to whom, how many children, if you were living, how many sons, if the eldest of them were living and what your estate might be worth per annum. All these Inquisitions were asked me by the Landlady where he lighted by his order, his reply after all we --- If you had not now a good Estate you would have one, I can infer nothing else than you may have some station in these parts --- I could not help --- letting you know --- he is now gone for Edinburgh and I know a person that is to meet him there in 20 days. Please to make my compliments (*compliments*) acceptable to all my Good and Kind acquaintances..

There does not appear to be any Grant of Arms and Crest used by the family of Clutterbuck registered in the College of Arms - in the Heralds Visitation for the county of Gloucestershire in the year 1623, the Pedigree of Clutterbuck was then Entered but no Arms produced - In the Visitation made in the same county Anno 1682 several branches of this family were also Entered with this Note as to the Arms.

Mr Clutterbuck produced these Arms but he must make better Proof before they can be Allowed to him.

And as nothing has been done in this matter since that time, the Arms continue in a state of uncertainty as no Proof of them by the Family has yet been made. But the Family may whom they think proper may have them legally Confirmed.

My dear Sir,

In answer to your letter of yesterday I inform you for the information of Mr Wetheral to whom I pay my respects I know of no person in Gloucestershire of my name except these of my own family. My grandfather Daniel Clutterbuck lived at Hyde near Minchampton in this county and followed the Professor of the Law he left several children two of whom only lived to have issue vis. Thomas Clutterbuck my Uncle and Lewis Clutterbuck my father who was bred up an Attorney which profession he followed till his death which happened in 1776 in Bath when he was Town Clerk many years. He left me his only son and three daughters each of whom have several children. I am as you now a Widower and have only the son named Lewis 12 years of age having resided here so many years on my own estate, my character and situation in life I leave you to describe as it will come from your pen with greater propriety than my own - My Uncle Thomas Clutterbuck resided many years at Avening near Minchampton in this county. He died last year at the age of 95 leaving seven children vis. four sons and three daughters all of whom are now living. Neither of the daughters (the youngest of whom is above 52) ever married . Daniel the elder son has five children, one son and four daughters, the other sons (the yougest of whom is about 50 years of age) are married but never had issue.

If any further information is desired and Mr Clutterbuck will do me the favour of expressing his wishes therein I have the greatest pleasure in pronouncing and furnishing him therewith and Mr Wetheral through his friend will perhaps have the goodness to give him my address as follows

PS. The late James Clutterbuck of Claverton House near Bath who died in the latter part of the year 1776 was the last of the Clutterbuck family who resided at Cirencester to acknowledge a relationship and left me the greatest part of his property.

Dear Sir,

Your letter (?) of the 15 I received, by which I am informed of your being in London, as also of your intention for Glostershire, as a favour I must confess I could not expect, but as you desire to see the place of your Family helps you to surmount all the Difficulties of Distance and the fatigue of so long a journey, you shall be welcome to such entertainment as my House affords, but which will fall greatly short of what you deserve, two spare bed chambers which is all I have, one of which is but small and indifferent, shall be at yours and your friends Service.

I dont know how you intend to perform your Journey, if you take the Stage Coach, there is one which sets out from the Bell Savage on Ludgate Hill which will bring you in one long day to Cirencester, a market town twelve long Miles from me. There is another Stage Coach sets out from the Bolt and Ton in Fleet Street (if I mistake not) which bring you in two days (through Oxford) then Glouc, seven miles distance from me, if you come in either of these, and if you will inform me the time, you shall be met either at the one or the other place by a Servant with a single or Double horse or both as you shall direct. If you travel in a hired coach, doubtless it will be driven by a coachman used enough to the roads to conduct you, and when he comes to Cirencester from which I presume is that Road from London he will most likely to take that being the Bath Road and most Travelled, and your way from thence to me is by Hampton Down Rodborough Hill which brings you into the Vale where I live and is about three miles distance from me and you must then take directions for Easton and for me at Millend where I hope you will find me glad to see you all.

As I am not acquainted with your method of travelling I think it is proper to inform you my stable is small, that I have no stabling for coach horses, and there is no Inne nearer than a mile from me, of which the coachman should be informed, and at that distance he may well be accomodated.

All with me join in compliments to your self Lady and Friends with.
